Some of the many featured presenters included: Rick Angus - Natural edge winged bowls, Jimmy Clewes - Oriental boxes and colored platters, Mike Hosaluk - Advanced spindle turning, Angelo Infrate - Turning palm nuts, Ken Lindgren - Dealing with bark, cracks, and voids.

The Totally Turning Symposium held in Albany, N.Y. recently featured Kip Christensen - 10 projects, fast and fun; Inlaid boxes; and woodturning design, Brian McEvoy- two piece hollowing and use of the boring bar, JoHannes Michelsen -Wooden hats, Alan Lacer- Befriending the skew, sharpening, and turning a lidded box, Bruce Hoover- Sanding secrets, Andre Martel- Turning lampshades, and the list goes on and on.

As you can see, these symposiums offer a broad spectrum of woodturning information. Also, if you happen to show up with any extra money in your pocket, there are many vendors at these meetings, displaying tools, wood and accessories that you absolutely cannot live without. These shows also have an instant gallery where you see some great work and get some useful ideas.

Around their house they created a park like setting, where they enjoy relaxing. While Carl is a turner his wife makes pottery items and they share the Gallery. Carl says that they provide each other with inspiration and



support. Carl stated that he had a back ground in electrical work and he had been doing woodworking for 20 years as a hobby, but now he has turned it to his main profession. He enjoys doing Yoga and has found working with wood at his lathe is giving him the same meditation effect. He gets all of his wood from our surrounding area and orchards working with dry or wet wood. My creations come during the time I am turning, because I work with the grain of the wood, so I can bring justice to the woods character. I feel that the soul of the tree continues in my work. The surrounding mountains and Forests of this National Park inspire my work and supply me with all the raw material I need to make my creations." The different Techniques I learned from taking Turning Classes (Melvyn Firmager) and from the various books, first and foremost from the Magazine "WOODTURNING." As you can see Carl has been a good student and stated that he particularly likes the large turnings. Manv of his turnings start out in the 600 plus pound range. I want to thank Carl and Trude for graciously taking time to chat with my family and friends and showing us their little slice of their Austrian Paradise. We spoke of the possibility of Carl some day coming to our part of the world to visit and if that comes about I will try to plan it around one of our meetings. 


From the Editor by Ed DeMay
