Although several people helped in finding a new location for our FLWT meetings (as well as all RWS SIG meetings), David Schafer had the task of spearheading this effort so I would like to thank him for all his hard work and a job well done!

Since the new CP Center location has a seating capacity for over 200 members, FLWT I & II decided at its April 2 joint meeting to bring the two clubs back together as one. If anyone has a strong opinion why we shouldn't get back together, please let me know of your objections.

Two events took place in the month of August:

- 1) RWS and CP Rochester were aired on the morning show on Monday, August 18th from 5:00 7:00 AM on channel 13.
- 2) RWS had its annual membership drive on August 23rd at CP Rochester from 9:00 until 2:00.

Those of us that join RWS prior to September 1st will receive \$5.00 off our annual RWS membership dues.

The BOD for Finger Lakes Wood Turners is preparing for this season's presentations and hands-on turning workshops. Please, help us help you and let us know what you would like to demonstrate or see demonstrated.

According to the FLWT bylaws, we will be having elections of officers and board advisors this year. Nominations are in October with elections in November. Anyone that is on the BOD must be a: 1) FLWT member, 2) RWS member and 3) AAW member. Board members are asked to serve a minimum of 2 years. RWS has two turners scheduled to demonstrate for us during the 2008/2009 season. David Hout (of DIY woodturning fame) will be lecturing and demonstrating metal spinning and turning a natural edge bowl in October and Alan Lacer (Taming the Skew) will be here in February to lecture, demonstrate and conduct a hands-on turning class. Class size is limited so don't wait long if interested in attending either session. I don't plan on missing either of them.



May Demonstration: The Art and Craft of Patternmaking

When Bill started his pattern making career, he was required to wear a dress shirt and tie to work

In the final presentation of the 2007-2008 year, Bill Tschorke demonstrated the art and craft of the patternmaker. Striving for au-


thenticity, Bill even wore the attire required in the early years of his career, of the profession in his early years, including dress shirt and necktie. Many of the tools and techniques that Bill demonstrated would be useful to turners undertaking segmented turnings. Some of the specialized tools Bill used included:

• Pinch dogs. Bill used pinch dogs to pull the segments together while gluing up. They look like giant staples, and are still manufactured by C.S. Osborne & Co. in sizes ranging from ¾ inches to 3 ½ inches (http://www.csosborne.com/no89.htm). A number of tool catalogs and online stores carry them, including Woodcraft and Woodworkers Supply.

Sanding stick. This one you have to make yourself. Bill's was about 6-8 inches long, tapering from about 1 ½ to ¾ inches (these are my guesses, and maybe Bill can give you the actual dimensions). The narrow edges were rounded, and one had a slot to hold the sandpaper. Bill used it to refine his final segment for a perfect fit.



- Trammels. Bill used these for making the templates for his piece. The advantage over a compass or dividers is that trammel points can make just about any size circle.
- 90° scribe. This was a finally pointed tool with a 90° bend at the end, so that the final segment could be scribed from underneath for a perfect fit.
- Pattern maker's saw. After scribing the final segment, Bill cut it to size with his pattern maker's saw. The blade is fairly thin, with a large number of teeth per inch and about 7½ inches long and 1½ inches wide.
