

April Demonstration: Working with End Grain


April's meeting featured a challenge project, so we were treated to a shorter presentation by Irv Tschanz. Irv presented tips on working with end gain. Some of his pointers were:

• A machinist's centering bit works well in drilling into end grain, as it will not wonder with the grain like an ordinary bit does.

• Mount a handle on a drill bit to drill into end grain, which saves time over getting out the Jacob's chuck.

- A skew chisel can be used to "dimple" the end grain prior to drilling.
- Use a straw (or a piece of tubing) to blow out the shavings.
- When using a scraper (or other tool) to hollow end grain, practice at the beginning of the piece with the tool rest a ways from the piece, so you can see the effect of working at a distance from the rest

once you are buried in the piece.


