



I spent several hours over the past two weeks preparing my shop for the winter turning season. Here are some of the things you might want to consider doing before the weather turns bad. One last thing you should do is check that your first aid box is fully stocked. Remember, we live in Rochester and many of us have our workshops in the basement. We might as well have a clean, bright and safe place to work.

September Demonstration: Photographing Your Projects

The new season of wood turning demonstrations kicked off in September, with a talk on how to photograph your projects, presented by Kevin Hart. Kevin presented five themes, which will enable you to improve your pictures without spending much money.

It's not about the camera

A simple digital point and shoot is all you need for great pictures.

Simplify, simplify

Eliminate clutter from your pictures by getting in close and using a simple background, such as a piece of white paper or poster board. A simple

"sweep" background requires only a stack of books or some other means of holding up the paper.

Get sharp, stay sharp

Get your pictures sharp by using a tripod (an adequate one will cost \$20 or so), lowering the ISO to 80 or 100, and using a smaller aperture (use the aperture priority mode and f/5.6 or f /8.)



"Before" photo. Project piece gets lost amongst the clutter!

Control the light

Turn off the float

Turn off the flash, turn off the room lights and use a simple light source such as a

window to control the color balance and direction of the light. Simple light modifiers (such as a white piece of paper or aluminum foil) can help shape the light.



"After" photo. Project piece is attractively presented without any unnecessary clutter!

Order out of chaos

Centering the object both top to bottom and side to side is boring. Try for more space at the top or bottom. Different vantage points (high or low) will emphasize different parts of the turning.
