
before the meeting begins! The festivities will begin around 5:45 PM.

Spindling to Better Bowls – Jim Echter

As a relatively novice turner, I have looked forward to the workshops that the club has been able to facilitate to promote learning and improving turning skills and experience. Bob Rosand's workshop came with a great reputation and an expert turner whose workshop was geared to someone at my level. The night before Bob was to present we learned that he had suffered an injury and needed to cancel his workshop. Mark Mazzo was forced to go to his bench. I have come to understand that if FLWT doesn't have anything else, it has a bench!

Jim Echter, stepped up to the plate and provided an evening of turning knowledge, experience and wisdom that was highly appreciated by novice and expert alike. Jim's presentation was titled "Spindling to Better Bowls." Why spindling? Jim strongly feels from experience that learning spindle turning leads to better tool control, learning how wood wants

to be cut and leads to completing a project faster, with better techniques and resulting in a better product.

Jim started out by talking about the tools of the trade. He showed and demonstrated the roughing gouge, the spindle gouge, skews, scrapers and parting tools. Along the way he talked about how to sharpen these tools. His philosophy is that sharpening is a balance between strength and sharpness. He demonstrated his preferred way that the tools should be sharpened to get the most out of them. As a newbie I heard him say, "don't think you have to go out and buy an expensive Sorby tool when a Benjamin's Best is the same tool just not polished." I wish I had heard that pearl of experience a few dollars ago.

Jim then went to the lathe and patiently demonstrated the art of spindle turning and along the way helped the listener understand getting good at this has lots of payout later in better tool handling, technique and so on. He demonstrated three basic spindle cuts, flats, coves and beads. Throughout he repeated the ABC's of tool control: Anchor, Bevel and Cut. Jim used straws to help us get the difficult concept of how wood wants to be cut. I have to admit, I think I am still confused and the straws help get the idea.

Throughout Jim was the patient teacher who clearly is committed to helping people learn proper techniques, grow in their confidence and enjoy what they are doing. Like Jim we have a lot of experience and talent in the group. I, for one, was grateful that he stepped up to the plate, especially as I use what I learned in these past weeks while making Holiday presents. I look forward to seeing Bob


Rosand's workshop at a later time, but was grateful for Jim's sharing his


knowledge and skill with us.

















The finished bead









The multipurpose skew








The parting tool







Cutting a cove in the edge of a bowl blank








Cutting a bead on the surface of a bowl blank












