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#### Jim Echter's Presentation on Production Woodturning Narration By Harry Beaver



Jim has been turning wood for about 35 years and does businesses under the name True Creations (truecreations.biz.) He got his start in production turning making specialized knitting needles and then started making "hundreds and hundreds" of drop spindles for fiber spinning. The many different styles of drop spindles built True Creations. He also creates kick spindles, nostepinnes, and niddy-noddys. His shop includes a range of lathes from a micro lathe to a large homebuilt bowl lathe. True Creations also provides custom turning services, he has made a wide range of turned objects to customer requirements, including furniture parts, bagpipe parts, lamp

posts, finials and other stair parts.

Jim offers classes in woodturning and has written four articles for the AAW journal including two on sharpening and sharpening systems.


Efficient production techniques and environment:

- Make batches of parts.
- Organize shop space for work flow and keep it clean.
- Tools located in organized manner can be located by muscle memory and used without conscious thought no time wasted in looking for them
- In production mode seconds saved or lost on multiple parts in a run add up to minutes the hours over a job run.
- Templates are crucial to production work and range from card board for a few parts to laser cut plastic for long term items
- Simple things such as determining the threads per inch of your tailstock's screw can be very helpful because counting turns of the wheel will translate to drilled hole depth.






Bowl for supporting a Tibetan spindle- using double sided tape to

As most of you know, myself and several others in our club have spent a good deal of time working with the Technology Class at Byron-Bergen Central School. I think it is very evident that our time and energy has been greatly appreciated by both the students and their teacher, Jay Wolcott. I would like to continue this effort again this year. First of all, I would like to take into the classroom and leave as many sample projects as possible. Jay is pretty open to projects we may introduce to the students. It would even be better if we were able to have some projects that utilize both some turning and some flatwork. However, this is not a prerequisite.

The students are grades 9-12 (Ages 14-17). Generally there is one or 2 girls in each class.

Obviously, the list of possible projects we could leave at the classroom is endlesscandle sticks, lamps, toys, ornaments and on and on.

It would be great if you could give this some thought and make a project you would donate to the school.

Secondly and oh so important, we could really use more help in the classroom. The class runs from 9:15 to 10:00am five days a week. We would like to be able to help from March 1<sup>st</sup> to the end of May. Last year, we were able to have our club's mini lathe in the classroom, but the students were only able to use it on the days when 1 of our members was in the class. There are also 2 old and very abused powermatic 45's. I think if you have a chat with Mike Brawley, Dave Ververs, Rich Connelly, Gary Russell or Harry Beaver, they will be happy to share how rewarding these classroom experiences can be. The students take a great deal of pride in their work.

Something interesting to point out is, that as a general rule, our guys have worked as a team, 2 in the classroom at a time. I think one benefit I saw arise from this is that it gave some of our members the opportunity to get to know a fellow turner much better. Car pooling is great. Think about teaming up with another member who may live near you. You will absolutely get to know and appreciate them better. You can also look forward to after class crumpets and tea (I've been watching too many Jimmy Clews videos) at the Bergen Farm Market (a restaurant).

Thirdly, we will be applying for an AAW Educational Grant. I would like to get two minilathes, something similar to the Delta 46-460, two good scroll chucks, and 2 sets of good tools. I will be pricing these items this fall. If you have any vendor or brand suggestions, please let me know.

Sounds like I'm asking a lot. I am. I hope you will consider a project for the students and then also consider spending some time in the classroom. I promise you a very rewarding experience.
