#### **TOPS UPDATE**

At the beginning of the December meeting we had a total; of 585 tops. Two hundred and seventeen (217) tops were turned in at the meeting, which brings the total to 802 tops.

With our goal of 1200 tops we thus have a short fall of 398 tops. Let's all give it a ;little push so that we can make our goal! Our weather as of late should be a positive factor.

FLWT Demo 12-21-17

On Thursday December 21 Scott Grove (scottgrove.com) gave us a demo on various embellishment techniques.

First Scott showed how he uses inlaid wood to embellish a bowl. After the bowl is turned, he makes a reverse mold of the bowl area where the wood will go by using Bondo. Bondo is used in auto body repair. It is liquid that is poured into the bowl and when it hardens you have an exact reverse mold of the bowl. Then soak your veneer wood to soften it up, glue into the bowl, then put the Bondo form on top of the wood and clamp everything together until it is dry. The excess can be trimmed off with a skew chisel.

You can also use inlay to embellish the outside rim of a bowl.

Next Scott covered inlay embellishment with wire. Determine what pattern you want – sometimes it helps to draw a pattern on the piece. Then chisel a slight groove into the wood. Select the metal you want to use, lay it in the groove, and hammer it in. Wet the wire with water to swell the wood, then seal with PVA glue. You can use simple copper wire, or buy other types of wire such as silver, etc.

Gold leaf is another common technique. Most "gold leaf" is actually imitation metal called dutch metal alloy. The metal can be variegated with heat or various chemicals to create an aged look.

Next up was resins. Scott uses crystal calcite to do various types of inlay. You can also use key shavings, aluminum flakes, or small diameter pipe like copper tubing.

Another option is gelled epoxy, which when dry can be turned. The glue that Scott uses has an 8-hour set time and can be heated to release the air bubbles.

UV cured resin can also be used. Scott uses Blufixx. Fill the gap, then shine the blue UV light on it and it cures in about 10 seconds.

Urethane materials such as Alumilite sets up fast. The proportions are critical – each part must be weighed to insure best results. Urethane does not work well in high humidity situations. You can mix in aluminum, brass, etc.

Next up was minerals. Turquoise, which is expensive, can be simulated with crushed polyester. You can also use mother of pearl. Small cracks in wood turnings can be filled with mother of pearl dust and CA glue. Or for a really cool effect use phosphorous dust which glows in the dark!

Members asked a lot of great questions, and all enjoyed the demo. It is great that FLWT has volunteers who arrange these demos. I always learn something from every demo I see.


