A Christmas Ornament with Erv Tschanz

At the regular October meeting of the FLWT Erv Tschanz gave a demonstration of turning a Christmas Tree. Because of Erv's landscaping connection, he has access to Yew. It is a good material for turning the trees, despite having a lot of reaction wood. While many of his trees are from Yew, the demo was on a piece of cherry.






The tree may have 5 tiers more or less and it also may have a natural edge base. The space between tiers increases from top to bottom and the shape is not a straight triangle. The height of the top tier is about the same as the bottom tier. The base is turned slightly offset from the tree. This is accomplished by turning the base and then moving the drive center to turn the tenon for the chuck.

Erv uses a ¼ in. spindle gouge, a small skew and a spindle roughing gouge. He says the spindle roughing gouge is his best tool. He used a thin diamond parting tool as a tiny skew. Erv used a big three jaw machinist chuck, which he says has a better grip on small tenons.

The tip of the tree is supported by the tailstock while the tiers are cut in with the spindle gouge. The spindle gouge is held left handed with the flute completely open (the flute is facing you and the tip of the tool is headed toward the tailstock).



The slicing cuts are very smooth but the top of the undercut is left with a small flat and a ring of light fuzz. The fuzz cleans off nicely with a piece of 100 or 150 grit sandpaper held flat just touched against it.





After parting the base most of the way off with the tip still held in the tail center, Erv removes the tailstock and takes the tip of the tree down to a point.

At the end of the demo Evr invited the audience to come up to the lathe and try the slicing spindle gouge cut.

Would you like to try out a new tool and work-holding method? The workshop provided a few different types of hollowing tools for us to try out and Ralph brought his rig with the laser pointer. It was a very successful time for all who attended. On October 22nd I attended Erv

Tschanz's Ornaments workshop, where he taught how he turns an offset holiday tree. Erv gave me one-on-one instruction most of the evening. We started with a "normal" tree then turned an offset tree, which was a challenging concept for me. Erv's patience and instruction were top-notch. I would like to share my experience of visiting the St. Michael's open shop program with club members who might be interested in doing the same. I was wary of the location and the parking arrangements, but neither of these presented problems. The location is a busy area with lots of foot traffic and support personnel present. The parking is surprisingly simple and very convenient. Terry was able to guide me to a parking space within steps of the entrance.

The St Michael's shop is an amazing space with a wide range of tools available. My goal was twofold. I had a "challenging" bowl project underway which was heading towards fire pit. I figured why not get a "second opinion" – another set of eyes on the project. This was helpful. I got confirmation of some of my hunches and I got some new ideas for proceeding further. I salvaged the project.

The issue of proper sharpening technique is a perennial challenge for me with a variety of "solutions" being proposed as correct. U Tube can be helpful up to a point, but it can also confuse the matter. It was nice to have a live interaction with an experienced turner who is open and flexible, not to mention the value of immediate feedback on my efforts.



It was very nice to see the youngsters coming in for mentoring – what a refreshing change to see youth engaged in productive activity. I would recommend at least a visit to this program for everyone.
