## **Mentor Profile Jim Byron**

Jim has identified himself as a source of information and teaching on general turning topics to include bowls, spindles, hollowing and sharpening.

I think, and Jim agrees that working face to face with another turner offers the richest and most effective learning. I know that Jim is a good teacher because he has taught me to better use some tools and to sharpen at the St. Michael's workshop sessions where he volunteers as well. Jim encourages members to reach out to him if he might help them develop in our craft. As with all our mentors, one need only to contact him via phone or email to start the conversation. Jim is very approachable. Many of you may have already met him, as he is the club treasurer with whom you deal regarding membership. Once you touch base about whatever learning you have in mind, Jim will likely invite you to his home shop. He likes beginning there because, as the conversation develops, he has a full complement of tools, accessories and stock available to demonstrate and teach. Depending on your issues, you and he may decide on a visit to your own shop as well.

Jim has built an excellent and comfortable workspace in his basement. The centerpiece of his shop is a Powermatic lathe. During his 12 + years of turning, Jim has graduated from a Jet mini, to a Grizzly and now to a Powermatic. Conveniently deployed around the shop are an array of sharpening tools, a band saw, his chisels and accessories and an efficient dust control system.

We spent some time discussing chisel types. Jim has thought more deeply about sharpening than most, I'd guess. I found myself interested in what he has to teach on the subject. When I asked Jim about his most frequent go to, or favorite tools, I was thinking chisels, but Jim said that he very much enjoys his vacuum chuck. Jim demonstrated how strong the hold of the chuck is and I came away with a better appreciation of its utility. Jim has a Jameson hollowing system. He also has a thread making jig that he built for his Powermatic. He showed me a few lovely, threaded boxes. Among other very nice pieces displayed in his home is a large and impressive burl that he, with some other members help, invested 18 hours to complete. I think you'll agree that the results are well worth the time.

### Green Wood Turning and Coring with Patrick Dioguardi

"You expected the Master and you got the Apprentice" Patrick told us. Sure, we had Ralph Mosher on the schedule to do a demonstration, but we were all very pleased to find that his grandson would do the demo. His clone, Ralph said. Patrick is 24 years old now and has been turning since he was 17. Mike Hatchey taught him how to make pens, and you can see the work on <u>Dioguardipens.com</u>. Patrick started working with Ralph in January.

He turned a bowl blank of Ash, at first discussing chucking methods and starting off between centers. He showed us how to index the bowl properly upon reversing the mounting in a chuck by making a small concave



on the bottom of the foot, to be confirmed by seeing light between the foot and a straightedge.



The bowl was cored with a One Way Coring Jig.

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Patrick was probably the most well equipped demonstrator we've ever had, as he had a dedicated on stage tool sharpener.



Patrick refined the outer shape of the bowl with delicate sheer scraping cuts from the bowl gouge. Mind there's a little flat spot here, but "don't tell my grandfather". I doubt it mattered, as the bowl was to be rubbed down with bowling alley wax and was destined to live in a cardboard box in the garage for a year to be turned again.



The bowl was clearly marked with Patrick's name, to avoid any confusion in the future.


