September 2022 Meeting Salt Box Design & Construction

Salt boxes are intended to be used in a kitchen to hold salt or other seasonings. The chef or cook can easily with one hand, slide the box open, pinch out some salt to season their dish and then snap it closed. Of course, these boxes can hold lots of other small items too.

The salt boxes that David makes are usually end-grain boxes and normally about 3" in diameter and about 2½" tall. The size can vary but anything smaller than 2" makes it hard to get your fingers into it. The sides and tops are usually flat. The box mechanism involves a 5 mm shelf pin from a big box store and two ½" rare earth magnets so the lid snaps shut. Almost any hardwood can be used. David will demonstrate the entire process starting with a rough block of wood and going through final sanding and buffing.

He will share some tips and the process that he uses. These boxes can be easily made in an hour if the wood is completely dry and stress free. His usual process is to do a rough prep and let the wood dry and come to equilibrium over a couple of months. Once dry, he finishes the insides, installs the magnets and pivot, trues up the outside and then finishes the box. Below are some photos of some of his creations







The woman poked her head in a while. Perinton invites us in the door of room 8A in the Perinton Rec Center on Saturday. She was curious. She saw something she hadn't seen before. There were machines in there making a lot of noise and there were wood chips all over the floor. There were two people at each of the

six machines, men and women. It looked like a bowl was attached to the machine. She had to ask, "what are you making?"

That was a great question. What was being made, in effect, was community education. scribed. To that end, we bring A part of the Finger Lakes Wood Turners Association charter, in addition to all of the other stuff that we do for members, is community education. We develop opportunities to reach out to the community and talk about, demonstrate and promote the art of wood turning. Most consistently over the years we have done that at the Perinton Rec Center and the Greece Rec Center. Greece is renovating their facility, so we have not been there

to provide a "Beginner's Wood Turning Workshop" during each of their sessions. We generally try to provide four of them each session, Fall, Winter, Spring and Summer.

Each session we host six students. Our goal is to introduce them to the art of wood

turning. Like any art form, it is helpful if you can see and experience what is being desix mini lathes, lights, chucks, gouges, face shields, measuring tools, small bowl blanks and most all of the stuff you might have in your shop if doing the same project. We bring finished products of our own so that they can see the kinds of things that are possible working with a lathe and wood. Most importantly we bring six instructors, club members, to provide one on one instruction from the beginning of the lesson to the end.

Our goal isn't that they leave the class having become a wood turner. The class is an introduction that helps them appreciate the machinery, the tools, sharpening, design, technique and safety. They leave with a small wooden bowl in their hand and a lot to think about, the possibilities. We

> pack up all the stuff, clean up all the wood chips at the end of the session and head home

knowing we have shared our art, got some people excited, including the ones sticking their head in the door. We have also gained club members who were turned on and want to learn more, as we did just in our last class

There are 15 club members who are instructors who always report having enjoyed sharing what they enjoy doing on a lathe. We could always use more instructors and would welcome any club members inquiry about what we do. This is a club sponsored activity and a part of who we are as a club.

AAW Symposium 2022 - Paul Wilkens

Chattanooga was the site for the first post-Covid American Association of Woodturners (AAW) symposium on June 23-26. There were more than a thousand participants in addition to vendors and other supporters - and what a great time my wife, Sue and I had! The talents of the demonstrators and the exhibits in the galleries were jaw dropping!

In addition to the opening reception and one special interest group (segmenting for me) on

Thursday night, the symposium provided ten different "rotations" or demonstrations, each 90minutes long, at four times on both Friday and Saturday and two more on Sunday. Discounting a couple rotations that were repeats, there were almost one hundred different demonstration learning opportunities. You can't get to everything you would like to see. With all those options there was never enough time to speak with the presenters or examine the marvelous work in the galleries. Vendors packed the Convention Center with nearly every tool or piece of wood you could want at the Tradeshow and yes, I did buy some stuff.

But seeing these world caliber turners demonstrating their skills and artistry was fantastic.

AAW knows how to put on a good show. And since we had Stuart Batty with us at FLWT the week before the symposium, there had been a good buildup to the speed turning contest held with Mike Mahoney. Funny thing – it turns out both Stuart Batty and Mike Mahoney are pretty good turners, and both made the event quite a spectacle! My vote went to Stuart's bowl as being the better of the two bowls made.

Now, in addition to the all the good things at the symposium, there was a special time for me. Each attendee at the symposium is given the op-

portunity to display three items in an Instant Gallery – which I did. On Saturday I got a text from John Beaver asking if I was willing to participate in the Sunday morning Instant Gallery Critique. Of course, it was an honor to have a piece selected even if it was only to harpoon it as an example of what not to do.

Beaver was the moderator of the critique panel and guided the discussion of the three panelists: John Jordon, one of our FLWT national presenters pre-Covid; Tib Shaw, the AAW collection curator; and Candace Reilly, the assistant director

> and curator at Blue Spiral 1 in Asheville NC. The panelists had selected a dozen or so pieces for the review, all of which I iudged to be fantastic in many ways (mine excluded). I thought that my box was probably chosen to have a large set of balpiece did make it stand out. Despite my trepidations, the panelists were kind with their comments, liking the simplicity of the box of many-colored pieces. (See the pictures.) They made two suggestions that, in their judgment, would have improved the piece:

- loons to pop, and the color in my design - a segmented cylindrical
- John Jordan commented that he viewed the finish was "raw". He suggested that if a shiny surface was desired, the final finish coat should have been sanded back and then buffed to a shine. My practice has been to apply Minwax Antique Oil finish, sand between coats until a uniform finish has been achieved and then apply one last coat "wet" and let it dry. Jordon's suggestion is a good one for me to try on a future turning.
- 2. They felt that design of the threaded top of my piece did not fit, match, or complement the cylinder. The panel thought it was the start of an-(Continued on page 14)

other piece of art rather than the top providing a finishing touch to the cylinder. Now, what the panel did not know is that the design had been

suggested by a consultant to this piece. He is, admittedly, a local consultant rather than a high-priced consultant from another area code, but an expert in his field, nonetheless. He, along



with my wife, had previously critiqued another box and suggested improvements to the design –not enough to satisfy my wife, perhaps but a distinct improvement. After the critique session I had an opportunity to ask John Jordan what he would suggest coordinating the top with the cylinder and to improve the design. "Ah", he said, "you will just have to play with it." So, anyone with suggestions is invited to make them. All suggestions will be appreciated. You will receive, in return, the same high commission given to Mike Brawley for his original idea.

The panelists also pointed out, and it showed in all their comments, that they viewed all the objects as pieces of art subject to interpretation and they viewed all the objects from their perspective as artists. They were not necessarily judging the objects for the fine detail of craftsmanship or process. There were no engineers on that panel!

Bruce Trojan brought his invited piece, "Still Life - The Old Barn Window", Construction pine, basswood, maple, polycarbonate, acrylic paint, 17½" × 21" × 7"

to Chattanooga. He had shown this outstanding work to us on one of our IRDs earlier this year – explaining how he had made the key, oil



can, window and other details. It was displayed in a separate section of the gallery along with other invited work – each piece showing the special talent and artistry of those few invited folks. It was nice to see a "home" product there. Congratulations, Bruce!

Summary of the symposium experience: Wow!! It was fantastic! There was an opportunity to see and talk with so many big-name turners: Ellsworth, Jordan, Beaver, Polite, Drozda, DeGroot, Lopez...but my favorite was Hans Weissflog from Germany making art you can hardly believe. Look him up. Here is one of his "bowls." It's hard to imagine how he makes something like this.

Q. Woody, when hollowing out the interior of a bowl, I always seem to get very light tear-out at the two spots where the side grain transitions to end grain. Is there a way to eliminate that entirely? Any help would be appreciated.

Thanks, "Torn Turner"

A: Dear torn, tear out occurs when you scrape end grain instead of cut it. Cutting Technique is the best way of handling tear out. Different grinds have different techniques from Batty to Ellsworth and somewhere in between, but all can achieve great results when

mastered. And don't forget about negative rake too. Take advantage of our mentor program. Our club library offers DVD by some of the best bowl turners such as Glen Lucas. Through repetition you will learn to get that clean cut.

What are our members techniques for minimizing or <u>eliminating</u> torn end grain. Can someone out there give our Torn Turner any additional advice in addition to the omniscient Woody????
