FLWT Board of Directors News

This November two club officer positions are up for election, **Vice President**, and **Treasurer**. Nominations and elections will take place at the monthly meeting on November 17. The board of directors meet once a month, the Tuesday after the monthly meeting. The board discusses issues, plans for future events, and guides the overall direction of the club.

From our Bylaws "The **Vice President** shall undertake all those functions of the President, which the President is unable to undertake, or those, which the President requests that the Vice President undertake or that the Board of Directors assigns the Vice President to undertake." Our vice president is tasked with lining up the talent for all member meetings. This means reaching out to both national turners and FLWT members to plan the monthly demonstrations and IRDs. Both consist of 4 separate turned pieces (body, hat, nose and broom). The broom is made of rose-ofsharon. The nose and hat also consist of some hand carving to get the curves but start out as a turning. The skirt is hollow to make it lighter.

Blank Preparation for Stuart Batty Workshop

This past June we held a Stuart Batty workshop for our club members. It was a complete success with every ticket sold. Have you ever wondered what it takes to organize an event of this magnitude?

Starting with contacting the instructor and designing a program that the membership will desire, organizing ticket sales, preparing the woodshop, cleaning the woodshop, hauling the shavings (50+ contractor bags of great mulch), providing lunch.... I could go on, but you get the idea, all of this done by club volunteers.

One major task for this event was providing wood blanks for each student. Specifically, 6 bowl and 4 spindle blanks for each student. This equated to 200+ bowl blanks, and lots of 4x4 spindle blanks.

Thanks to Gary Tveit and his willingness to provide the ash and maple, and his trusty sawmill to cut the trees into cants. Once the cants were cut Gary called in the recruits to help cut the cants into bowl blank length and then chop the corners off the blank to form an octagon to Stuart's specification.

The work didn't stop there, several loads were then delivered to St. Michaels woodshop and hauled to the basement. Thanks again to Gary Tveit for his generosity of supplying and cutting the wood. Also thanks to the other volunteers who help process the wood, Cliff Weatherell, David Gilbert, Dick Kosbab, and Larry Lobel.





I signed up for the "Turn A Pumpkin Box" with Tod Raines in response to Cindy Drozda's periodic emails on upcoming demos. I purchased my "ticket" for this via Tod's website: Woodworking Tool Store:


The zoom demonstration was broadcast live on Saturday, September 24. For 3 ¹/₂ hours Tod provided great instruction on how he turns, carves, and colors his Pumpkin Box.

Tod turned an end grain box and said a face grain blank can be used. He started with a cylinder approximately 4 ³⁄₄" diameter by 5" long. Using a bowl gouge and parting tool the basic form of the pumpkin was formed.

Several tools were used for hollowing. First a half round bar with a Large HSS teardrop cutter formed the initial hollow. Tod switched to the Jimmy Clewes Mate #1 Undercutter Hollowing Tool to show how this could be used to hollow as well.

After the initial hollowing was complete Tod set up the Lyle Jamieson Hollowing System (a link to Lyle's website is on Tod's site) on his Powermatic Lathe. A laser measuring system helped maintain a consistent wall thickness. The Jamieson hollowing tool is articulated to

allow an optimum cutting angle of the tool.

A Cindy Drozda Signature Square Recessed Scraper (available on Cindy's website) was used to form a parallel edge on the lid opening.

Tod used the chuck end of the blank to jam fit the box and finish the bottom of the hollowedout box. At this point the lathe indexing system would be used to add carving lines on the box.

He then used the tenon formed for the jam chuck as the tenon for the leafy box lid. Again, the lathe indexing system would be used to locate the leaf separations on the lid.

With the box complete it was time to start carving. Tod has a simple table set up he locks on to his lathe bed. He used a series of small carving motors and an assortment of power carving bits to shape the pumpkin body and leafy lid. For this demo he carved 3 sections of each. Tod did say a Dremel tool could be used as well. He likes the smaller micromotors since they fit better and allow him better control.

A participant asked how long it took Tod to completely carve the box and lid - about 12 hours. Sounds like a nice winter project to snuggle up in your favorite chair while the snow flies.

Air spraying alcohol-based dye is Tod's main method for coloring. Wiping or brushing on are also good methods if you don't have an air sprayer. Acrylic paint is another option.

For a \$15 ticket price this demo was a wealth of information. A PDF file with instructions for completing the project as well as a list of tools and links for many of the products he used was sent. The video is be available to participants for 60 days. In addition, Tod offered a 10% discount on tools off his website through the following Sunday.

Where are all the Spindle Turners?

In the August 2022 (vol 37, no.4) issue of American Woodturner Mike Darlow discusses a statistic Michael Hosaluk stated. Michael claims only 5%- 10% of the turners he knows are spindle turners.

This is covered on page 11 in the Woodturners Chatter column. Here's a quick summary of Darlow's comments.

- 1. Few turners have machinery needed to prepare spindle blanks.
- 2. Bowls are typically designed on the lathe whereas spindle turned articles are designed on paper first.
- 3. Availability of quality teaching is lacking.
- 4. Spidle turning is less fun? More difficult to become competent?
- 5. Declining interest in spindle turning has resulted in shorter turned pieces and therefore tools for larger turning are in decline.

Darlow poses the question: "Is the decline in spindle turning good or bad?" He makes the case that spindle turned woodware items are still greatly welcomed. He points out that unless a turner has a reasonable competency these items will unlikely be made.

Hmmm. There are plenty of competent spindle turners in the ranks of the Finger Lakes Woodturners. In fact, many members are competent at both. It seems our club is a statistical outlier. - Dave Pollatta

Tool Feature - Hunter Badger Series

The **Badger Straight Tool** was designed for the box makers and the turners who like to work on smaller but deep vessels. The 5/8" shank with a turned taper to hold the # 3 Cutter provides the woodturner the right tool to smooth out those deep vessels and boxes.

The **Badger Full Swan Neck Tool** is 5/8" bar stock with a turned taper to hold the # 3 Cutter. The shaft is about 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " long. This tool is especially useful for turning the undercut areas in boxes and the insides of hollow forms such as a Southwest style hollowed form. It is a variation of the standard Badger Straight Tool, with the only difference being the distinctive swan-neck.

This tool is not currently in the FLWT Tool LIbrary



The **Badger Series** of tools are real problem solvers. The box makers, vase makers, and those that turn small hollow forms find the Badger Tools useful "go to" finishing tools.

Q. Woody, With the great weather we've had, I haven't been in the shop at all this summer. Now, when I look at my lathe, I feel like I've forgotten everything I knew. I'm almost afraid to start. What do I do?

A: Dear Rusty,

Start simple. Don't try to "make" anything. Instead throw a piece of green limb or old firewood between centers and practice your spindle turning. Cut coves and beads until there's nothing left, then toss

it all and do it again. Your old skills will soon return and maybe even improve. And, because it's not a "project," you're not committing yourself to hours of work and concern for design and finish. Just get started, play, and have fun. Time enough for that other stuff later. And next summer, you'll find this practice makes a great rust inhibitor.


