Beginner's Corner - Dave Pollatta

Grow Your Skills

This is a new segment intended to help the beginner and novice woodturners. There are many great resources available to help. Starting with small turned projects that require little investment in time and wood. Confidence can be gained quickly since it's easy to toss the smaller pieces in the burn pile if things don't turn out the way you like. I know!.

I recently participated in Cindy Drozda's Live Zoom Demo titled "Grow Your Skills - Gifts and Craft Show Projects". Below is a summary of the items Cindy Turned. She is a great resource. This demo was nearly four hours in length so she covers these topics in great detail.

The December 17th St. Michael's Open Shop will feature *Last Minute Gifts with Phil Rose*. This will be a great great opportunity to grow your skills with Phil!



Bottle Stoppers

- Cindy used these as training for finials
- Practice beads, coves, different tools
- ♦ Try different materials & finishes
- Quickly compare different shapes & features



Door Stops

- This design requires a pommel cut
- Can practice pommel cuts using gouge or skew
- Can also vary the design of the ends
- ♦ Plus this makes a very unique gift!!!



Bud Vases

- Great project for developing eye for form
- Practice gouge cuts on a larger scale than Bottle Stoppers or Door Stops
- Can quickly make several to compare designs



Flower or Candle Vases

- Another project that develops eye for form
- Don't have to hollow so they are quick to turn
- Insert can be used for cut flowers, candles, tea lights, LED lights, etc.

FLWT Community Outreach—Mike Sullivan

The Finger Lakes Wood Turning Association has a strong commitment to education. That is readily seen all the programs that are developed monthly for club members to take advantage of and continue to develop their skills in turning. However, our commitment to education is broader than ourselves.

The club has a strong investment in mentoring the students at St. Michael's Woodshop multiple times a week. More members being involved in that basic turning education is always encouraged. Beyond our own club space, we also have a strong commitment to providing education to the community.

Nearly every month club members provide a four-hour workshop at the Perinton Recreation center. Community members curious about wood turning sign up to take this workshop. We teach six beginner students at a time with a mentor assigned to each student. We talk broadly about wood turning, the lathe, the gouges, design, turning safety and share our own experience. Each student turns a simple bowl during the workshop with the guidance of their mentor. Our goal is not to turn individuals new to turning into experienced turns, but only to give them a fun and guided experience of turning that might promote with interest in learning more. We talk about FLWT and encourage

them to join us for a meeting, meet other turners and learn more.

FLWT members can feel intimidated by joining this group of mentors, but they don't need to be. This is a simple project and current mentors will spend time with new folks to help them feel comfortable with this activity. It often starts with attending a Saturday session and seeing how it works.

There are many benefits to this activity. Joining other mentors is great camaraderie, you meet some really interesting students, it is a chance for your own skills to keep developing, you see students get excited about what they accomplished and learned just in this workshop, and you have the satisfaction of providing a valuable educational opportunity to the community. Every month kids and adults alike stick their heads in the door and ask, "Wow! what's going on in here? How do I sign up?" Every month we have a wait list.

So please think about joining this group of mentors. You don't need advanced turner skills. It is a great experience, and more mentors will spread the opportunity. We have workshops planned for January, February, March, and April 2023 and are working on scheduling May and June. Take a risk, Come join us!"



Rebecca DeGroot Walking Mushrooms

Saturday, December 17, 2022 3 p.m. Eastern Time



In this demonstration, Rebecca will walk you through the process of creating her signature walking mushrooms! Not a mushroom lover? The skills and techniques taught in this demonstration can be used to bring personality to all sorts of projects!

She will begin by turning a simple mushroom cap, prepared for pyrography texture, followed by turning a body ready to be carved. Each mushroom has at least three turned legs, which are cut apart, and using spline joinery, reassembled into new forms. Once the lathe work is finished, Rebecca will show you how she carves the body to create a curved neck, use a woodburner to create texture underneath the cap, drill and countersink holes in the body for the legs. Finally, after all the individual pieces have been carved, shaped, burned, and sanded, Rebecca shows you the assembly process and presents the finished piece!

Ask Woody & FLWT Breakfast



Q. Woody, why does Tom Wirsing use a water-dampened Abralon pad to apply his signature finish on his platters? It would seem that the finish would be incompatible with water, so any water on pad's surface would cause some precipitation at that interface. Or is this part of the "magic" of the finish?

A; In the February 2018 issue of American Woodturner Tom Wirsing wrote an article describing his Platter finishing process. Tom uses a well wrung out piece of 500 grit Abralon to remove the scratch pattern left by the 400 grit. Tom removes the platter and uses the damp abralon to raise the grain on bare wood. Tom apples an initial coat of

finish and then subsequent coats are applied with the 500 grit Abralon sanding pad that he leaves soaked in finish. A copy of the article is included with the video reply of Tom's demo. Abralon is very flexible and provides an even scratch pattern. It is also used on bowling balls!

Tool Corner & Tool Library

Abralon Sanding Pads

Tom Wirsing discussed using Abralon (a foam-backed abrasive made Mirka) while final sanding and finishing his platters. A number of turners and woodworkers use Abralon. So what's so special?

Open Cell Structure

Foam based Abralon features an open cell structure. The benefit of this is that Abralon retains water and finish exceptionally well during wet/damp sanding operations.

Even Surface Pressure

The Abralon's foam structure provides an even surface pressure to the abrasive fabric regardless of the contours and curvature of the sanded material. This prevents the abrasive from cutting through the paint, clear coat or lacquer, for example when sanding sharp or rounded edges, and it also works for prolonging the life of the abrasive.

Final Finish Sheen Control

See this month's Ask Woody as well. After finish is applied Tom Wirsing uses water-dampened 500 grit pad to reduce the reflectivity of the finish. He then uses 1000 grit to get the final sheen he desires. Check the Mirka site for more information - this is just to wet your appetite!
